Statutory Instrument Consultation Document Proposed 50mph permanent speed limit

Summary of the consultation

Topic of this consultation	National Highways Limited's proposed statutory instrument which would reduce the speed limit from 70mph to 50mph on the northbound off-slip road of the M23 motorway at junction 7 in Surrey where it joins the A23.
Scope of this consultation	This consultation provides the opportunity for you to share your feedback on National Highways proposal to reduce the speed limit to 50mph on the northbound off-slip road of the M23 at junction 7. The proposed change is explained in this document.
	We welcome your comments on the proposal. We specifically would like to hear how the proposal could affect you, your organisation or those you represent.
Geographical scope	The M23 Junction 7 northbound off-slip road leading onto the A23 in Surrey.

Getting to this stage	The M23 motorway is located in West Sussex and Surrey. It runs from Crawley to the M25 near London.
	The M23 northbound carriageway joins the A23 just south of Hooley village in Surrey. The A23 runs through Hooley village.
	Over the past five years data shows that the number of collisions occurring in Hooley village, resulting in personal injury, is far higher than the national average for the type of road. Speeding vehicles are a large contributing factor.
	The local police and the Hooley Residents Association are concerned that the speed limits both on the approach to Hooley and through the village are too high. At present the speed limit on the A23 approach to Hooley is 50mph. The speed limit through Hooley village is 40mph. Similar proposals are in place for the speed limit

on the A23 approach to be reduced to 40mph and the speed limit through Hooley village to be reduced to 30mph.

To implement the lower speed limit through Hooley village safely, a gradual step-down of speed limits on the approach to Hooley village is required. The proposal is to reduce the speed limit on the M23 off-slip road leading onto the A23 from the national motorway speed limit of 70mph to 50mph. There will then be a reduction to 40mph on the A23 approach to the village, with a 30mph speed limit imposed through the village. This gradual reduction in speed limits is considered safer than a sudden drop in speed limits. It is also more likely to result in compliance through the village of Hooley.

The speed reductions on the A23 and through Hooley village will be dealt with separately using permanent traffic regulation orders. This consultation solely concerns the implementation of a 50mph speed limit on the M23 northbound off-slip road leading onto the A23.

Executive Summary

This consultation provides an opportunity for interested parties to comment on National Highways proposal to reduce the existing speed limit of 70mph to 50mph on the M23 northbound off-slip road at junction 7 leading onto the A23. The 50mph speed limit will, if approved, be a permanent speed limit and will be clearly displayed on signs, which will also indicate where the speed limit starts and where it ends.

The 50mph speed limit will be implemented by National Highways making a new statutory instrument. Once in force, this statutory instrument will prohibit driving at a speed exceeding 50mph within the speed limit extent detailed in the statutory instrument.

The introduction of a permanent 50mph speed limit on the M23 off-slip road means that vehicles exiting the M23 would approach the A23 at a reduced speed. Separate plans are in place for the speed limit on the A23 approach to Hooley village to be reduced to 40mph and the speed limit through Hooley village to be reduced to 30mph. These changes will be made using permanent traffic regulation orders and are outside the scope of this consultation. The anticipated impact of this 'step-down' of speed limits is that there will be a reduction in road traffic accidents in Hooley village.

We welcome comments specifically on how the proposal could affect you, your organisation or those you represent.

1. How we are conducting the consultation

1.1. What is this consultation about?

This consultation solely concerns National Highways proposal to reduce the speed limit on the northbound M23 off-slip road at junction 7 leading to the A23. The current speed limit on this slip road is 70mph (the national motorway speed limit) and we are proposing to reduce this to 50mph.

1.2. Why do we need to reduce the speed limit to 50mph?

This change is required to facilitate a gradual drop down of speed limits starting at the northbound M23 off-slip road (proposed 50mph speed limit) and then along the A23 (proposed 40mph speed limit). The speed limit through Hooley village will be reduced to 30mph.

These speed limit changes are required for safety reasons. At present the number of road collisions occurring in Hooley village is higher than average. To safely manage the speed limit reductions and achieve a higher level of compliance with the proposed 30mph speed limit through Hooley village, a gradual stepping-down of speed limits is necessary. The stepping-down of speed limits will begin on the northbound M23 off-slip road.

2. Legislative changes

2.1. Proposed legislative changes

Subject to the outcome of this consultation, National Highways proposes to make a statutory instrument under sections 17(2) and (3) of the Road Traffic Regulation Act 1984 ("RTRA"). Sections 17(2) and (3) of the RTRA permit the making of Regulations (by way of a statutory instrument) that regulate the manner in which, and the conditions subject to which, motorways may be used by traffic authorised to use such motorways.

The proposed statutory instrument would introduce a 50mph speed limit on the northbound off-slip road of the M23 as it joins the A23. The point where the 50mph speed limit begins and ends would be clearly indicated to drivers using appropriate signs. The specific section of road affected would be set out in the Regulations.

3. Proposed changes


3.1. Background

Hooley village is situated just north of the M23 motorway, along the A23 in Surrey. Over the past five years the number of collisions occurring in Hooley has been far higher than the national average for the type of road. Vehicles travelling above the speed limit are considered to be a significant contributing factor to these collisions.

Both the police and the Hooley Residents Association have concerns that the speed limits affecting Hooley village are too high. At present the speed limit on the A23 approaching the village is 50mph. The speed limit through the village is 40mph. Similar proposals are in place for the speed limit on the A23 approach to Hooley to be reduced to 40mph and for the speed limit through Hooley village to be reduced to 30mph. These changes are outside the scope of this consultation and would be implemented separately using permanent traffic regulation orders.

To safely implement the lower speed limit through Hooley village a gradual drop down of speed limits on the approach to Hooley village is required. This proposal is for the M23 off-slip road leading onto the A23 to be reduced from the national motorway speed limit of 70mph to 50mph. This gradual 'step-down' of speed limits is considered safer than a sudden drop in speed limits. It is also more likely to result in compliance through the village of Hooley.

3.2. Plan of the affected stretch of road



3.3 Proposed changes

The proposed statutory instrument would impose a 50mph speed limit on the M23 northbound off-slip road leading onto the A23. The 50mph speed limit would start from a point approximately 212 metres south of Shepherd's Hill. The 50mph speed limit will end at the point where the M23 becomes the A23. The total length of road which would be affected by the 50mph speed limit is approximately 1004 metres.

Appendix A: Frequently asked questions

Q. What are the proposed changes?

A. The proposal is to reduce the speed limit on the northbound off-slip road of the M23 at junction 7 leading onto the A23 from 70mph to 50mph. The reason for this proposed change is to ensure a gradual reduction in speed as vehicles approach the A23 and the village of Hooley.

Q. How are you going to enforce the speed limit?

A. Speed limits are enforced by the police. National Highways is not an enforcement agency and has no powers of enforcement.

Q. Is the introduction of a permanent 50mph mandatory speed limit likely to be effective?

A. The introduction of a lower speed limit on the M23 northbound off-slip road is likely to result in vehicles approaching the A23, and subsequently Hooley village, at a lower speed. A gradual step-down of speed limits is more effective and safer than a sudden drop in the speed limit. The speed limit reduction is likely to result in fewer collisions in and around Hooley village.

Q. Why is National Highways consulting?

A. It is a statutory requirement for National Highways to consult on statutory instruments made under section 17 of the Road Traffic Regulation Act 1984.

National Highways is committed to providing an effective consultation and complies with the Government's Consultation Principles. This consultation provides an opportunity for interested parties, individuals and stakeholders to comment on the proposed changes.

All responses received within the consultation period will be considered. Following the closure of the consultation period, a consultation summary report will be published on our <u>CitizenSpace</u> consultation website. The summary report will provide an analysis of the comments received and National Highways response to these.
