Statutory Instrument Consultation Document Proposed Permanent 40mph Speed Limit

Summary of the consultation

Topic of this consultation	National Highways' ("NH") proposed statutory instrument which will implement a 40mph permanent speed limit in both directions on the M32 motorway from a point 83 metres north of the northern mechanical join of the Eastville Viaduct to a point 22 metres north of the Severn Beach railway line overbridge.
Scope of this consultation	This consultation provides the opportunity for you to share your feedback on our proposed introduction of a 40mph permanent speed limit on the M32 in both directions from a point 83 metres north of the northern mechanical join of the Eastville Viaduct to a point 22 metres north of the Severn Beach railway line overbridge. The permanent 40mph speed limit will ensure that this stretch of the M32 conforms to current design standards.
	This proposal for a permanent 40mph speed limit will replace the temporary 40mph speed limit that is currently in place on this section of the M32.
	The proposed amendments are explained in this document.
	We are keen to have your comments on the proposal set out in this document. We would specifically like to hear how the proposal could affect you, your organisation or those you represent.

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Executive Summary

This consultation provides an opportunity for interested parties to comment on our proposal to introduce a 40mph permanent speed limit on the M32 from a point 83 metres north of the northern mechanical join of the Eastville viaduct to a point 22 metres north of the Severn Beach railway line overbridge, in both directions.

The proposed speed restriction will be implemented by NH making a new statutory instrument. This statutory instrument will amend the current 60mph speed limit over this section of carriageway.

We welcome comments specifically on how the proposal could affect you, your organisation or those you represent.

1. How we are conducting the consultation

1.1 What is this consultation about?

This consultation concerns NH's proposal for the implementation of a permanent 40mph speed limit in both directions on the M32 motorway between a point 83 metres north of the northern mechanical join of the Eastville Viaduct to a point 22 metres north of the Severn Beach railway line overbridge.

1.2 Why do we need the 40mph speed limit?

A temporary 40mph speed limit is currently in place on the M32 in both directions between a point 83 metres north of the northern mechanical join of the Eastville Viaduct to a point 22 metres north of the Severn Beach railway line overbridge. This temporary speed limit was implemented using a Temporary Traffic Regulation Order as a result of an operational review which deemed the speed restriction necessary for safety reasons.

We're now proposing the 40mph speed limit is made permanent in the form of regulations made by way of a statutory instrument.

The speed limit changes are required due to the geometry of this section of the motorway. The elevated section of the motorway around junction 2 has limited forward visibility and narrow hard shoulders which doesn't meet the design standards of today's motorways. In addition, junction 2 and junction 3 are located close together, which results in a high level of weaving traffic (i.e. manoeuvring between traffic lanes). The proposed speed limit changes are required on safety grounds and to help ensure a smooth-running network.

2. Legislative Changes

2.1 Proposed legislative changes for the implementation of a 40mph speed limit.

Subject to the outcome of this consultation, NH proposes to make a statutory instrument under sections 17(2) and (3) of the Road Traffic Regulation Act 1984 ("RTRA"). Sections 17(2) and (3) of the RTRA permit the making of Regulations (by way of a statutory instrument) that regulate the manner in which, and the conditions subject to which, motorways may be used by traffic authorised to use such motorways.

The proposed statutory instrument will make permanent the current temporary 40mph speed limit on the M32 carriageway in both directions between a point 83 metres north of the northern mechanical join of the Eastville Viaduct to a point 22 metres north of the Severn Beach railway line overbridge. The permanent 40mph speed limit is necessary on safety grounds and to help ensure a smooth-running network.

An impact assessment has not been prepared for the proposed statutory instrument as no significant impact on the cost of business or the voluntary sector is foreseen. An Explanatory Memorandum will be published alongside the Regulations at www.legislation.gov.uk in due course.

3. Proposed 40mph speed limit


3.1 Background

The M32 Eastville Viaduct is an elevated 1.1km section of the M32 - a 7.1km-long motorway that links the M4 at junction 19 (Hambrook Interchange) with Bristol city centre. It is part of the Strategic Road Network (SRN) owned and maintained by National Highways and carries 65,000 vehicles a day.

The structure was built in the 1970s to design standards of the day. If the structure was built today with its geometry causing limited forward visibility and narrow hard shoulders, the speed limit would be set at 40mph.

A review of the structure found the design doesn't meet current standards and as such a reduced speed limit is necessary to ensure the speed matches the design geometry.

3.2 Map of affected stretch of the M32 motorway



3.3 Proposed changes

The permanent 40mph speed limit is proposed in both directions between a point 83 metres north of the northern mechanical join of the Eastville Viaduct to a point 22 metres north of the Severn Beach railway line overbridge, as shown on the map in section 3.2 above.

The speed limit changes are required due to the geometry of this section of the motorway. The elevated section of the motorway around junction 2 has limited forward visibility and narrow hard shoulders which don't meet the road design standards of today's motorways. In addition, junction 2 and junction 3 are located close together, which results in a high level of weaving traffic. The proposed speed limit changes are required on safety grounds and to help ensure a smooth-running network.

3.4 Enforcement

Obtaining an acceptable level of compliance with the permanent 40mph speed limit is key to the successful and safe operation of the speed limit.

NH is not an enforcement agency and has no enforcement powers. Enforcement of the 40mph speed limit would be carried out by the Police. No new offences or sanctions will be introduced because of the proposed regulations.

Appendix A. Frequently asked questions

Q. What is happening?

A. NH is proposing to implement a permanent 40mph speed limit on the M32 carriageway between a point 83 metres north of the northern mechanical join of the Eastville Viaduct to a point 22 metres north of the Severn Beach railway line overbridge, in both directions. This section of road is currently subject to a temporary 40mph speed limit. To improve safety and to help ensure a smooth-running network we are proposing to introduce a permanent 40mph speed limit on this section of road and install associated speed limit signs.

Q. Why is National Highways consulting?

A. It is a statutory requirement for NH to consult on regulations made under section 17 of the Road Traffic Regulation Act 1984.

NH is committed to providing an effective consultation that complies with the Government's Consultation Principles. This consultation provides an opportunity for interested parties, individuals and stakeholders to comment on the proposed changes.

All responses received within the consultation period will be considered. Following the consultation period, a summary report will be published on NH's website within 12 weeks of the consultation ending. The summary report will provide an analysis of the responses received and NH's feedback on these.

Q. Who can respond to this?

A. Anyone affected by the implementation of the permanent 40mph speed limit can respond to the consultation. The consultation is aimed at any affected stakeholder groups including individuals and organisations.

Q. Is the introduction of the permanent 40mph speed limit likely to be effective?

A. The introduction of the permanent 40mph speed limit on this section of the M32 is required on safety grounds due to the geometry of this section of motorway. It will also help ensure a smooth-running network.

Q. When is the permanent 40mph speed limit likely to become implemented?

A. Subject to the outcome of this consultation we intend to implement the permanent 40mph speed limit by the end of summer 2025.

Q. How are you going to enforce the speed limit?

A. NH is not an enforcement agency and has no enforcement powers. Speed limits are enforced by the Police.
